PUBLIC & DIGITAL HUMANITIES PROJECTS

[*Chicory Digital Archive of African American Poetry*](#), Creator, 2016-Present

A forgotten magazine of poetry, art and literature by predominantly African American residents of Baltimore, *Chicory* was a publication of the Enoch Pratt Free Library from 1966-1983. An extraordinary resource that offers insights into the lives and experiences of its writers, whose work was published unedited, I rediscovered it while conducting archival research for my book, *Come*

and Be Shocked: Representing Baltimore from John Waters to The Wire. Working with an advisory board made up of former *Chicory* editors, the Enoch Pratt Free Library, and the Digital Maryland State Repository, I led the effort to digitize the magazine and make it available online, with primary responsibility for fundraising and coordination. The online archive will now become the centerpiece of a larger digital public humanities project, the *Chicory Revitalization Project*, on African American poetry, urban history, and its relevance to contemporary social issues.

At Home in Newark: Stories from the Queer Newark Oral History Project. Chief Curator and Professor, 2017-Present.

In partnership with the Queer Newark Oral History Project, graduate students in Place, Community and Public Humanities in Fall 2017 researched, curated, installed and assessed the first ever public exhibit on LGBTQ life in Newark. We worked closely with community partners including the Newark Public Library and LGBTQ Community Center to develop the exhibit themes and content. The exhibit, which opened at the Newark Public Library in December 2017, examined how LGBTQ people have made Newark a home in the face of discrimination, racism, poverty, homophobia, transphobia and violence. From Rebellion to Review Board: Newark Fights for Police Accountability Exhibit. Chief Curator and Professor, 2017-Present.

Graduate students in Place, Community, and Public Humanities in Fall 2016 researched, curated, installed, and assessed this exhibit on community responses to police misconduct in Newark since the 1960s. Our class partnered with the Newark Public Library, a team of community and scholarly advisors, and an undergraduate class in Spanish and Portuguese Studies who produced a complementary exhibit in Spanish on the "Latino" riots in New Jersey in the 1970s. The exhibit, funded through a Cultural Programming Grant through Rutgers University-Newark, was on display at the Newark Public Library from December 2016-February 2017 and at the Express Newark gallery from March-April 2017. Students in Introduction to Digital Public Humanities (Spring 2017) created an online version of the exhibition.

[Telling Untold Histories Unconference](#), Co-Founder and Chair, 2014-Present

Telling Untold Histories is New Jersey's public history unconference. Using a radically democratic format, Untold Histories brings together public historians, librarians, archivists, educators, artists, students and members of the public to discuss how we can ensure that the history told in our cultural, historical and educational institutions represents the diversity of our communities in the past and present. This statewide unconference offers discussion sessions, workshops, lightning talks, and other activities to provoke collaboration and skill-building. As chair, I am responsible for managing and fundraising. To date, the unconference has raised several thousand dollars from various state foundations and grantmakers and draws approximately 150 attendees annually.

Telling Untold Histories: The Ironbound, *Organizer*, October 6, 2017

This daylong mini unconference was offered in partnership with the Newest Americans as part of their public history project on the Ironbound neighborhood of Newark.

Open Data Editathon for Hurricane Relief, Organizer and Workshop Presenter, September 29, 2017

In response to the devastation caused by hurricane Maria in Puerto Rico, I coordinated an open data mapping editathon with colleagues at Rutgers University Libraries. Attendees learned how to

edit and add data to Open Street Map to help relief workers on the ground. This effort was covered on NJ-TV, PBS Newshour, and WABC-TV.

Waterfront South Environmental Justice Walking and Digital Tour, Director, 2013-2014

In partnership with the Center for Environmental Transformation in Camden, NJ, two undergraduate students and I researched and developed a walking tour of the Waterfront South neighborhood focusing on its social history. This tour became the basis for the organization's orientation process for new volunteers. I created an online version on the digital mapping platform, HistoryPin as well.

Public History Boot Camps, Creator, 2013-2014

With the Mid-Atlantic Regional Center for the Humanities, developed a series of professional development workshops for public historians with seed funding from the 1776 Foundation.

Literature & Medicine: Humanities at the Heart of HealthCare and Poetry Heals!, Coordinator, 2008-2013

This statewide program based in hospitals for medical staff used the discussion of literature to develop cross-cultural sensitivity, encourage empathy, and alleviate burnout among healthcare professionals. Poetry Heals was an outgrowth created in partnership with CavanKerry Press, which trained poets to facilitate dialogues on healthcare issues through literature.
